UPPER SECONDARY SCHOOL

TEACHING

Scheduled classes every day

Fewer scheduled hours, but more hours of study time that you plan yourself

COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE

Recorded absence

Absence is only recorded in some parts of the programme

SUBJECTS

Most subjects are compulsory

You design part of your education yourself by choosing your specialisation

HOMEWORK AND EXERCISES

Your teachers decide what homework you have to do and your assignments are pre-defined (e.g. "Analyse this text")

You are responsible for your own preparation and learning e.g. in the project work, where you and your fellow students choose which topics you want to work on.

ASSIGNMENTS

Lots of assignments

Fewer but bigger assignments and projects

Is RUC different from other universities?

At RUC, project work takes up half of your study time. Every six months, you choose which topic and problem you want to work on within your programme. You then immerse yourself in it and learn how to write a project report in collaboration with other students and sometimes in co-operation with companies."

How long is a day at university? Is there a lot of assignments and homework like in secondary school?



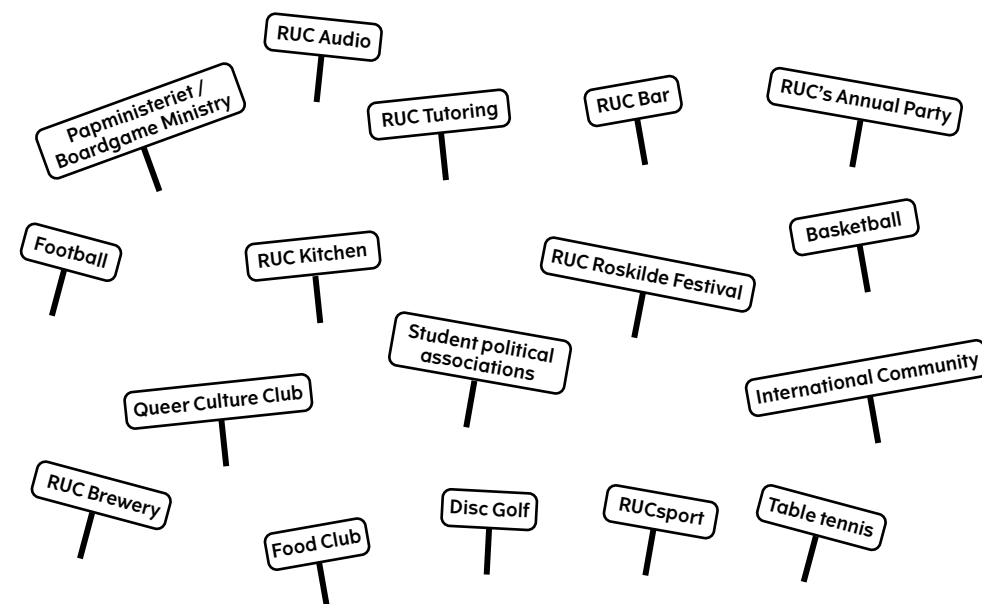

Welcome to the communities

At Roskilde University:

At Roskilde University, you put theory into practice

Every semester (i.e. every six months) you will write one major project alongside your courses. In the project, you work on a problem chosen by you and your group.

50%

Supervision from researchers and in-depth work on real-world issues



You and your project group will be assigned a project supervisor who will support and advise you in your project work. You set the agenda for the meetings and send written presentations and specific questions before the supervision meetings, to ensure you get the most out of your project supervision.

Courses – what does that mean?



The courses are part of your education on the programme. This can be in classes, lab-work, workshops or lectures. You have some preparation for each course, e.g. material to read, and there are also assignments and exams for each course."

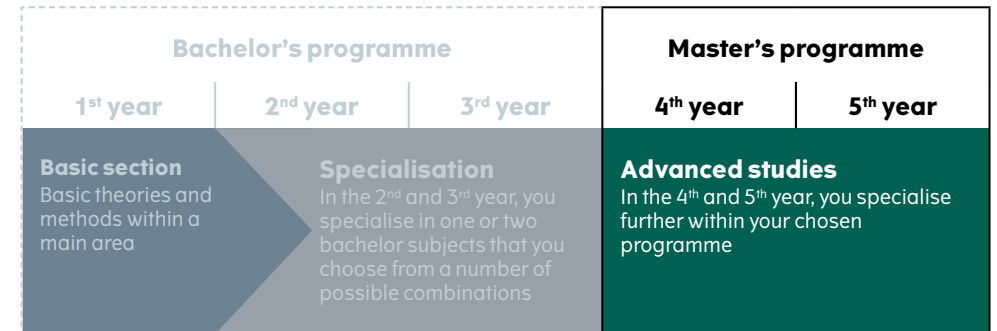

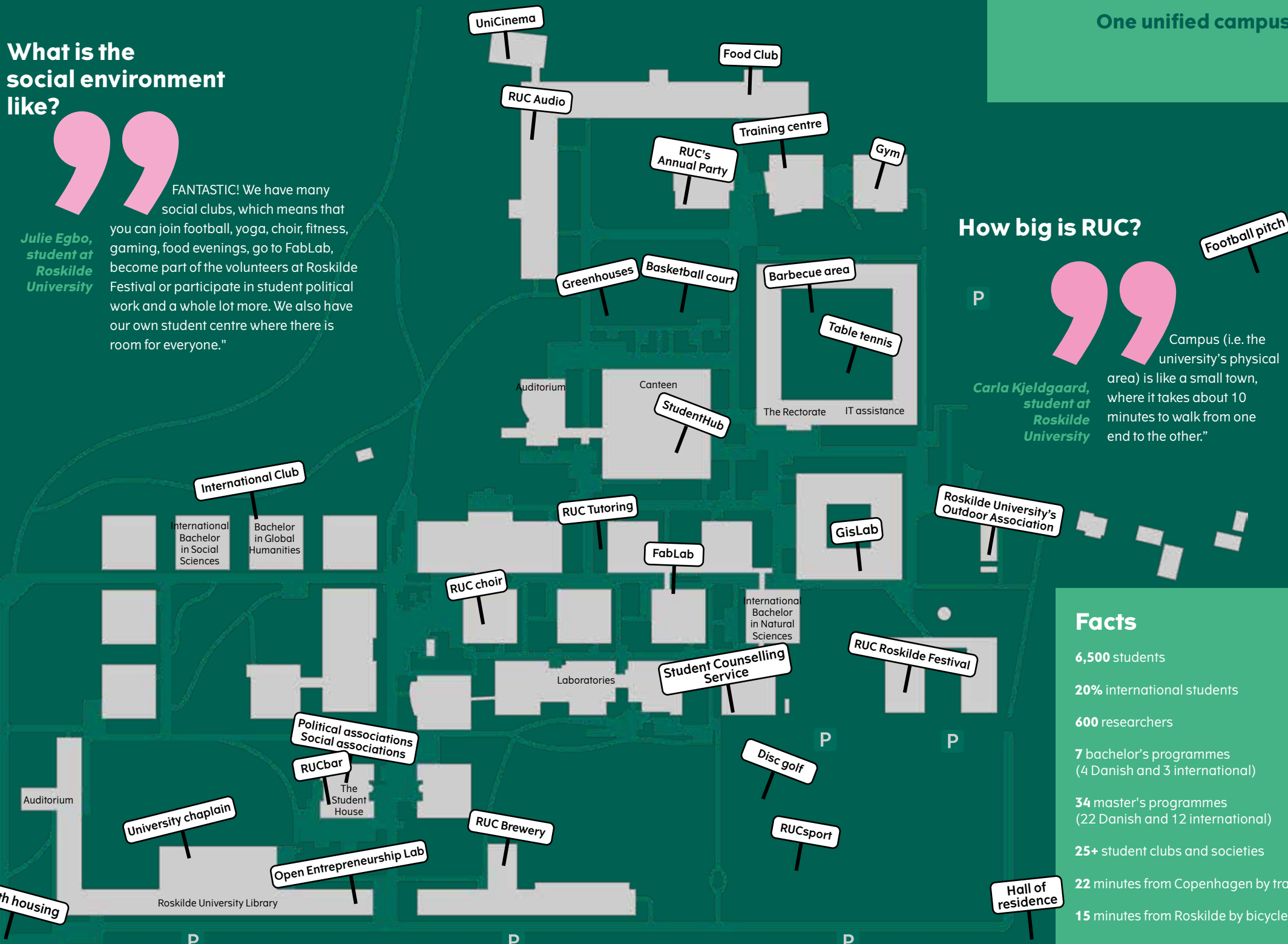
One unified campus
